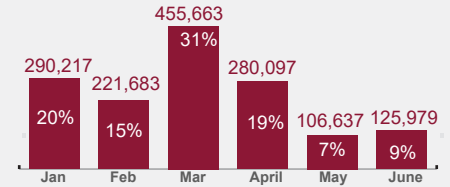


Key progress indicators



Highlights

- Inputs for the Periodic Monitoring Reporting have been sent to the Whole of Syria Secretariat. The PMR measures the progress of the SNFI sector in Syria towards the target fixed in the Humanitarian Response Plan 2016. With regard to the provision of NFI assistance the 2016 progress is similar to the previous year. From January to June 2015 1,438,339 individuals have been assisted with NFI while during the same period in 2016 1,480,277 individuals have benefitted from a kit or a single commodity distribution. The development of the emergency readiness strategy through the monthly tracking of stocks inside Syria and Turkey has expedited the aid delivery process especially for the new arrival kits and tents distributions. With regard to the general shelter activities they seem to keep the same pace as per last year while an increase in the adoption of emergency shelter solutions has occurred. This is mainly due to the strong technical guidance provided to the Cluster membership through the establishment of a TWiG. The introduction of minimum standards and especially the review of the vocabulary around the emergency shelter kits have promoted the kit as valid shelter alternative especially in such volatile context where people get displaced multiple times. The rehabilitation of private shelters remains the predominant activity contributing to the resilience and cohesion of communities and households. The security of land tenure still represents an important constraint in the assistance to renters so the rehabilitation is mainly addressed to owners residing in houses damaged by the conflict.

- An ad hoc meeting on Aleppo city has been chaired in order to understand the view of partners active in the eastern part of the city on the potential encroachment. The capacity of the cluster has been assessed on the basis of the possible scenarios. A plan has been finalized and shared with the main stakeholders.

- UNHCR has launched an Expression of Interest for a Shelter/NFI assessment in Syria.

- The Cluster Assessment Registry has been launched. During the first round of meetings the Cluster Information Manager Omar al-Daher has already collected data from nine member organizations. The assessment registry will support the secondary data review during the UNHCR sector oriented assessment and the HNO 2017 data collection process.

- The Technical Working Group has completed the review of the NFI/Shelter kits standards. The Guidance note will be updated with the winter response minimum standards. The next TWiG cycle will start addressing the shelter response strategy and technical standards.

Cluster Priorities

- Respond to the ongoing displacements especially within the host communities in coordination with Damascus and Jordan hubs
- Increase the access to shelter and improve the standards of the shelter stocks
- Advocate for the centralization of the stocks

Challenges/Gaps

- The update of the People in Need figures at sub-district level is crucial in order to determine accurate gaps. The data available is from September 2015 (WOS assessment).
- Constraints in stockpiling big amounts inside Syria due to access, condition of the roads, security, size of the trucks.
- Continued assistance to besieged areas.

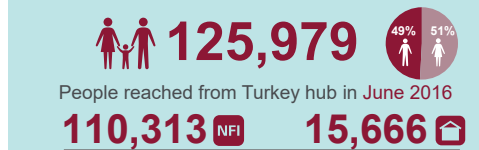

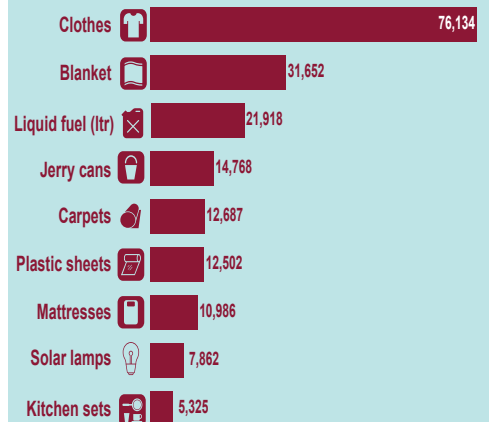
